

Preface

Paul Auster's novel *Moon Palace* was published in 1989. Marco Stanley Fogg's discovery of his heritage in a reality which is dominated by chance and experienced in fragments is the American author's most renowned work, along with his famous detective stories from the *New York Trilogy*. The reader is drawn into a diverse complex narrative consisting of reflections, biographies and allusions to historical and cultural-historical events and characters, with scenes from Wild West mythology and life in the metropolis of the East.

The purpose of this book is to facilitate an understanding of this work of contemporary American literature. It discusses the most important topics and structural principles and can be used either for additional background knowledge or as material in class. Given its rich diversity, particular emphasis has been placed hereby on the text analysis of *Moon Palace*. Complicated contexts are drawn together and are clarified in chart form (see chapter 1.3 and 2.3). The analysis is based on Faber and Faber's edition of *Moon Palace* (Faber and Faber Limited, London, 1990). Annotations can be found in chapter 2.5 and page numbers are cited to facilitate the understanding of the novel. Secondary literature is quoted in the footnotes. Finally, chapter 3 should enable the reader to put his/her comprehension of *Moon Palace* to the test.

1.2 Historical background

The following summary gives an overview of the most important historical events against which the novel is set. This is intended to complement the reader's background knowledge, as well as to explain any unclear circumstances that may result from the subjective narrative of the first-person narrator².

The Vietnam War (1964-1975)

The Vietnam War is generally understood to be the deployment of the US military against the

so-called Vietcong and the armed forces of North Vietnam between 1964 and 1975. However, the American mission in Vietnam really started in 1955 when a few US military advisors came to South Vietnam to support the government, which was under pressure from the Communist North of the country. North Vietnam was being supported at the time by the USSR and China. After Mao Tse-tung's victory in China, the US government, fearful that it might lose Vietnam to Communism (Domino effect theory), began supporting the South militarily as well as economically. The Communist resistance in South Vietnam responded by founding the Front National de Liberation du Viet-nam Sud (NLF, National Liberation Front of South Vietnam), the military wing of which was named Viêt Nam Công San (Vietnamese Communists) or Vietcong. The Vietcong was at war with the government of South Vietnam and their army. Aware of the government's weak position and their lack of support from the predominantly rural population, the US government immediately increased their military aid.
